PROJECT DESCRIPTION: A Site Approval application to modify a sign requirement in the C-FS zone. The modification requests to 1) increase the permitted height of a pole sign from 45 feet to 54 feet and 2) increase the permitted size of a pole sign from 80 square feet to 294 square feet. The property is not under a Williamson Act Contract.




